This Booklet gives you the Candidate Profile also in most cases, for you to understand the Personal Interview and relate to it better.

2. Functional Dossiers: If you want to pursue an MBA in Marketing, choose that dossier first.

4. Sample AWT from the dashboard to understand the Structured Approach. WAT / AWT / AWA – All of these are same terms of Writing test assignment conducted across various IIMs.

Prerequisite:

- Form to be Submitted (Interview)
- Resume (not mentioned, good to carry)
- Original Documents along with photocopies

Insights - Writing Ability Test:

- Time Allotted is 10-30 minutes
- When given an abstract topic time allotted is less
- When given a specific topic for in-depth analysis time is given separately for ideation and writing

Sample WAT Topics -

1. Higher pay is a solution to corruption?
2. Greed is good.

Insights – Interview:

- **Interview time** - 20-30 Minutes. (Sometimes as low as 10 mins)
- **Interview Panel Details** – 2 to 3 people (two Professors and One Alumni, earlier it used to be 3-4 Panelists)
- **Interview Type** - NO Stress Interview (Unlike Bangalore / Calcutta) (Check your thorough knowledge of subjects (Companies) / high on Current Affairs (Online if you say))
- **Interview discussion Pointers** – (as per IIML experiences of last five years)
- Be completely prepared with anything and everything on the form.

- They will go into details of everything you speak about in the interview. (level1- what do you know about Indian Economy level2- what do you think about GST, level3- how has GST affected the sector you work in).
- It is absolutely fine to ask for time before you answer (they often expect you to think about a solution when they ask you about a problem at hand).
- It is fine if you are anxious and you need not portray a brave face being real with your emotions is better.
- Be prepared to answer everything about your work experience or about your favourite subjects if you are a fresher.

Greetings exchanged

M- Welcome Saumya. So you have a history background. Please give us your form and your cat scorecard.

Gave.

M- wow, you have a very nice score (99.4; around 98 in all 3), you must have worked very hard.

Me- thank you sir.

F- when did you graduate?

Me- ma'am, 2023.

M- You must have gone for some coaching.

Me- yes sir, I did.

M- I guess you must have had maths in your +2, right?

Me- No, sir. I have a humanities background. Would you like to see my 10th and 12th marksheets?

F and M- yes, yes, please show us.

Continued to give good remarks. Did not look at my form.

M- started to name subjects from my grad to himself.

Me- (after he was done) Yes sir, these are mostly history ones. I took up fundamentals of marketing as an additional course when i started to identify my interests and career path. I even did an internship at a company under the marketing and BD team.

F- what did you do there?

Me- Ma'am, it is a chocolate company called xyz. it was foremostly at a client-facing role, noting down their feedback and analysing the data to forward suggestions to marketing team for ad development. I was also in a team wherein we acquired some b2b deals given that it was diwali gifting season then. We managed to get two.

F- oh you got two (chuckled a bit), how were you doing this?

Me- ma'am we would contact the HRs on LinkedIn and other platforms and cold email them.

F- how many emails would you all send in a day?

Me- around a hundred, ma'am.

F- did you use any tool for this?

Me- yes ma'am, salesql.

F- did you wonder how that tool operates?

Me- went on to say how I used it, the steps, but said that i didn't exactly know how it functions algorithm-wise.

F- you must be targeting upsc or planning the same for future?

Me- Ma'am, I did think about that career path for myself, but that service requires a very high level of dedication and discipline, and me being a college passout i feel i need to study more, equip myself with more skills; basically get some hands on experience for now (something along these lines).

F- what do you understand with management?

Me- gave an answer based on my PORs experiences, could have been more coherent and precise.

M- you must have studied about british east india company. What was their business model?

Me- Went to tell about how they exploited our handloom industries and shifted the populace to agricultural activities; imposed high tariffs on our finished goods exports; turned us into exporters of raw materials for their mills; made us a market for their cheap mill-made products.

Took a couple of seconds to get into the rhythm of my answer, paused in between around 1-2 times.

Could have been more coherent, but overall he seemed satisfied.

F- business leader whose management style inspires you?

Me- mentioned Richard Branson, whose book I'd read.

M- what is Richard Branson's company, and what do they do?

Me- Virgin; travel and hospitality-

F- no Indian one?

I was thinking about whose name to use when M interrupted.

M- a motor company that packed up its operations from india?

Me- sorry sir, I do not know.

M- that's ford. Name a foreign pharma mnc working in india?

Me- sir, sun pharma?

M- no, that's indian.

Me- sir, may I take a guess?

Me- yeah yeah

Me- cipla?

M- yes that's correct.

(came home and checked; cipla is an indian mnc. confused.)

F- any news that you read, business, political?

Me- yes ma'am, I read about the Zee-sony merger that was called off.

F- what happened?

Me- went on to tell the allegation by SEBI, leadership hassle, said what could have been the benefits of the merger and what needs to be worked on to prevent such things in future.

Overall a well-rounded answer. They agreed with my remarks.

F- what other calls do you have?

Me- listed my calls.

It then ended.

Went on for about 20 minutes. They were very sweet and soft-spoken. Did not interrupt me ONCE while I spoke. I was smiling throughout, did take some pauses when I couldn't recall the exact term/name.

Interview Experience – 4

IIM Lucknow interview experience

WAT: imagination is more important than knowledge

2 panelists 1 male and 1 female

P1

M: So deep where are you from and what is your family background?

F: What are your hobbies?

I said *working out*, *riding my bike* and playing cricket (emphasis on the first two as my interview revolved around it)

M: Oh nice, which bike do you ride?

M: Where have you been for riding?

Lonavala, lakes near palghar i.e. sinchan lake, vandri lake and malshej ghat

M: Sounds interesting to ride a bike at malshej ghat.

M: So tell me how Mumbai fulfills its water supply?

I am not sure sir, but I know there's ample rain in Mumbai.

M: no but how does it supply water?

I said BMC supplies everyday (idk what I was thinking here to answer this)

F: it's not like rain se seedha tanki me paani aa jayega and how BMC gets water to supply to household is what exactly we want to know (she was smiling and making me comfortable, not at all in a grilling tone)

I said I am unaware about it

F: R u nervous? Because I feel u know the answer

Both of them told me to relax.

F: ok, take 30 seconds, I know that u know the answer, it's very easy, use ur "IMAGINATION" (our WAT topic)

I said ok mam, as far as I know it takes water from nearby lakes.

F: there u go, see I knew u knew the answer.

M: name some of the lakes

I wasn't sure but I did mention that Powai lake is famous but it's not potable water

M: how was mumbai formed, can u name the islands

F: How good is your eyesight

I said my right eye is lazy but my left eye is perfectly fine. (She wasn't able to read the sugar content in Co pico chocolate) So she gave me the chocolate to tell the sugar content

There was mention about liquified sugar but not the percentage.

F: Is that ethical?

In my opinion it is not ethical, brands shall mention the sugar content as it is harmful and people do care about their calorie intakes.

F: oh u said u workout so u do feel nutrition is imp, so tell me about ur nutrition, u must have increased protein intake so do u take supplements?

P1: I just read an article on AI being the best slave and the worst master. Define AI, ML and talk about the topic (above one).

Me: Gave an appropriate answer and talked about efficiency, time saving, great at repetitive tasks for the best slave and lack of empathy, doesn't understand the conditions in which humans work or think for the worst master.

P1: So what do you call an AI that does repetitive tasks?

Me: I didn't know.

P1: It is called narrow/ weak AI but it isn't weak compared to us. (Laughs)

P1: Gen AI a narrow AI?

Me: No sir, it could talk to us and it could think so it is not.

P1: yes, that's why it is called artificial general intelligence. But it is just a in initial stage.

P2: Tell us about yourself

P2: (interrupts) Why are you not mentioning your stream in UG? Don't you think it is important?

Me: I humbly apologized and said I was trying to be generic and mentioned my stream.

P1: Where is your company located and some questions about the client and products

P1: Now you're currently working in XXX company.

Me: No sir, I quit my job very recently

P2: Why did you quit?

Me: Honestly answered that I needed time to prepare for MBA entrance examinations and to figure out my career advancement

P2: Why ABM?

Me: Agricultural sector is a major contributor to the Indian economy

P2: (interrupts) ok tell me honestly why you want to do ABM. (I Justified)

P1: Explain the difference between supply chain and value chain in agriculture, with the help of an example

Me: I had no idea about it. I said I haven't come across the term, I will make sure to look into it

P2: What are your hobbies? How much time do you spend on it? (explained)

P2: Tell me your family background? (Told)

P1: What areas in newspaper interests you the most?

Me: I said business related and global happenings.

P1: Tell me about the Red sea crisis and how Indian economy is getting affected? What are the alternate steps taken?

Me: (jackpot question). I knew everything about it, so explained it clearly

P1: Ok, Why China being such a populous country facing deflation while all other countries are facing inflation

Me: (another jackpot). I said due to very less consumer demand and the tech sector is the major contribution to deflation in China.

P2: What other calls do you have? (Told)

P1: You have received calls from all the IIMs Samvritra and laughed. Then they asked to leave

Thoughts: Very chill and relaxed interview. Did not interrupt me often and they listened throughout the time I was speaking. P1 was a very nice person, he seemed very convincing of all my answers.

Interview Experience – 9

Profile: GEM

10th (CBSE) - 10 CGPA

12th (CBSE) - 94%

Graduation (MNIT Jaipur) - 8.63

Work Experience: 24 months of work experience at Hero Motocorp.

Reached the venue just on time (I've pledged myself to not arrive early for anything). Document verification was done, and after about 45 minutes, we were instructed to follow a guide to our interview locations.

Initially, we had a WAT round (10 minutes).

WAT Topic: Is Hydrogen the future of cleaner and greener fuels?

The topic, in my opinion, was a bit easy since we're inundated with information about sustainability in the news every now and then. There were 10 interview panels.

Interview: My Interview panel (Both middle-aged M)

Greetings! Told me to produce the document folder.

P1: Tell me about yourself.

Me: Standard introduction.

P1: What is the difference between calisthenics and a normal strength training gym routine?

Me: Calisthenics involves using our body weight to work against gravity, which is the resisting body, unlike external weights in strength training. Both programs give excellent results to the fitness of the body. I personally believe that calisthenics yields better muscle mobility and endurance compared to the gym; however, you can build strength relatively easier in the gym.

P1: Fine! Tell me about your role at Hero MotoCorp.

Me: I worked in one of the six manufacturing locations of Hero, in the Gurgaon plant, in the Project Engineering department, wherein I managed the development of new models and facilities with respect to steel phase components of the engine. I also coordinated the TPM activities and played a significant role in claiming the TPM Special Awards for the Gurugram Plant.

P1: What is different about Hero's bikes when compared with Bajaj?

Me: (Didn't click at the moment, so I said whatever was coming into my mind) Hero MotoCorp has the largest share of two-wheelers globally, and since most of its market is concentrated in India where consumers are price-sensitive, Hero has maintained this position by developing pocket-friendly bikes. So, price competitiveness is one of the many parameters, in which Hero, when compared with Bajaj, dominates.

P1: Tell me about the technological parameters.

Me: (Took some time) Sir, since I look after engine parts, I can tell the difference with respect to technologies associated with engines.

P1: Go on.

Me: In the engine cylinder of our 100cc bikes, we don't deploy plateau honing operation, which is not the case with Bajaj. This makes the engine of Bajaj slightly better with respect to oil retention in the cylinder and consequently, the engine life.

However, oil retention of such a level is more of a prerequisite in higher cc bikes, and this operational cost is eliminated by Hero.

P1: But then isn't Bajaj's engine superior in the lower segment bikes? And also, you seem more like a finance guy since you have been talking about price quite a lot.

Me: Introducing high-end technology to lower segment bikes does not make a quantum difference, as far as I believe. Also, if we take longevity into consideration, other bottleneck parts may give up before the engine, and that generally goes well beyond ROI.

P1: See, again finance lingo 😊

Me: (Fake smile)

P1: Okay, you left your job, and I believe to prepare for CAT. Did you have any conflict with your boss or any relationship issue with him or your colleagues?

Me: (*I left the job to prepare for RBI & gave CAT as a contingency plan*, but I didn't say this) Sir, indeed I left my job to prepare for CAT since I assumed that the chances of scoring high would be hindered with the job. And I had very good relations with my RO and team members (which indeed is very, very true).

P1: I'm not at all satisfied with your answer, and I believe you're not telling the truth.

Me: (With an emotionless face like that of Saitama)

P1: Okay, give your opinion on Forex Reserves.

Me: Gave a decent answer and also told the exact figure since I'd visited the figures a day before; I was checking on the phone.

P1: What is it about the Adani scam?

Me: Told about the Hindenburg allegations and stock manipulation.

P1: You're giving way too brief answers.

Me: Let me elaborate, sir (Told as much as I knew)

P1: Heard of Russia Ukraine war?

Me: Yes, sir.

P1: Why did Russia invade?

Me: Told

P1: Thank you! You may leave now.

P2 was just smiling throughout the interview and didn't say anything apart from greetings.

Interview Experience – 10

Location: Institute of Hotel Management, Dadar

Panelists:

P1: Male, 40+

P2: Female, 30+

WAT: Restricted access to students to use the internet (Being an engineer, it was an easy one I guess) — 10 mins

P1: Graduation/college

Me: Told

P1: Have you lived your whole life in Mumbai?

Me: No, currently working in Pune.

P1: Tell us the difference between Pune and Mumbai culturally

Me: Told about the diversity between Mumbai and the rich Maratha heritage in Pune. Gave an example of Shivaji Jayanti celebration according to the Maratha and English calendars.

P1: Abstract and interface difference

Me: Told.

P1: What sports do you play?

Me: I told Karate I used to play and had a conversation on this.

P1: Team Sport and organization relate

Me: Told confidently.

P1: Relate it to a product

Me: Done, gave my project example itself.

P1: Why MBA (since I gave most of the examples with my work experience)

Me: Told how I am currently not into core problem-solving.

P2: (Wasn't satisfied with why MBA)

Me: Told how I want to solve problems outside the tech domain as well. Mentioned my work with an international startup - interrupted.

P2: Example?

Me: Solve problems - promote Mumbai - gave 2 ideas - city of dreams (people from all walks of life, Bollywood, business), certain areas still not popular like the Sanjay Gandhi National Park, which is the world's largest national park within a city.

P1: Do you read books?

Me: Yes, non-fiction (self-help).

Mention 2 books - How to Win Friends and 5 am Club

P1: Have you won any friends? (Laughing)

Me: I said I have developed bonds.

P1: Do you wake up at 5 am? (since I mentioned the 5 am club)

Me: I said sometimes at 6 am.

P1: Are these books effective?

Me: Yes, certain simple strategies that we tend to ignore - gave an example from Dale Carnegie's book.

Done

It was more of a conversation, with me being judged every now and then. There were some more questions which I don't recollect.

Interview Experience – 11

Profile: 10/95.4/82.11/98.88

Interviewers: 1 male, 1 female

Questions asked:

- You have excellent grades in your 12th grade. Why didn't you go for a good college like DU? (I completed my undergrad at Kumaon University and explained financial issues.)
- What does your father do, and how many siblings do you have?
- Why MBA?
- What is your source for getting news? (I use Inshorts and YouTube videos for the same.)
- Can you inform us about G-20?
- What is ESG? (Didn't know. They told me it's environmental, social, and governance.)
- How is ESG important for Uttarakhand? (I am from Uttarakhand and talked about the importance of tourism, the Joshimath crisis, etc.)
- You are a fresher. Will you be able to cope up here with work-ex people? (Explained the importance of being a fresher.)
- Tell us about your three strengths and weaknesses?

That's pretty much it. I was the second one to be interviewed in my group. It was a good experience overall.

Interview Experience – 12

Profile:

Female, General Category, Class 10: 95% (CBSE), Class 12: 93.17% (CBSE), Grad: B. Tech (ECE) from SRMIST, Chennai, 91.75%, CAT'22: 99.68%

Work Experience: Software Tester for 3.5 years at State Street Corporation, Bangalore.

WAT: "Net zero carbon emission would save our planet. Do you agree?"

Panel: 1M, 1F

Me: Entered with the PI form and greeted them.

M: "Where is your folder? We want to see the folder."

Me: "I kept my folder outside."

M: "We want to see everything. Go and bring it."

I brought my folder, and he took it and kept it aside. They only needed the form. Then and there, I understood this is going to be a stress interview.

F: "Tell me something about yourself."

Me: Started giving the prepared answer but was interrupted by M on work experience.

M: "What does your company do?"

Me: Told that it is a custodian bank and one of the oldest in the US. Mentioned the functions of a custodian bank and who their clients are.

M: "What are your roles and responsibilities?"

Me: Again gave the prepared answer. First started with the functions of a tester, and my day-to-day work, and then explained briefly about the project I was working on.

M: "I am not understanding your project. Explain in depth."

Me: I tried explaining in depth, but M kept interrupting. (I was getting tense, and that made me laugh a little. Thankfully, that lightened the situation a bit!)

M: "I am still not understanding what you are saying. You are not clear about what you do. According to me, you and your company are useless and doing nothing!"

At this point, M started talking in Bengali out of frustration!

Then F interrupted and said she works in tech in the bank. She doesn't work in finance.

M: "Oh, then you could have told me in the beginning. So much confusion!"

F: "Anyway, we went off-topic a little bit. You mentioned that you have moved a lot. Why?"

Me: Told that my dad was an engineer at NTPC, and we moved to a number of projects in different parts of India.

F: "Give some advantages and disadvantages of constantly moving around."

Me: Gave the prepared answer.

M: "Which domain do you want to work in, and how would MBA help?"

M: "What other things are taught in MBA apart from finance?"

Me: Told other fields of management and mentioned a few subjects taught at IIM Lucknow. (I went through the curriculum of IIM Lucknow the day before. Got lucky in this!)

M seemed satisfied with my answer.

M: "You did engineering in ECE and now work in software. How would your experience help you in MBA? No, how would ECE help you in an MBA?"

Me: (I think he knew from my facial expression that I had a prepared answer for the first question. That's why he changed it.) Told how most concepts in ECE are based on imagination since we cannot see electrons moving or a voltage drop in a diode. This makes most of the concepts in ECE quite complicated. Since I have already understood those complicated concepts, I would definitely be able to imbibe the various concepts of Finance in MBA easily. (At this point, I was just babbling nonsense!)

M: "I am not an engineer. Does that mean that I don't understand concepts of Finance?!"

Me: "No, Sir. But, me, studying ECE for 4 years would definitely help 'me' in understanding."

M: "Do you remember maths? How good are you in maths?"

Me: "Little bit. Out of practice for quite some time now."

M: Gave a problem on a matrix. Had to solve simultaneous linear equations using a matrix.

Me: It was an easy question, but I couldn't do it at that moment. Still, I tried solving it.

Higher pay- is it a solution to corruption?

There were 8 candidates in the group exercise. 15 minutes were allotted to the candidates for testing their respective written ability skills. I wrote about the pros and cons of higher pay directly leading to the

change in mindset of money-hungry people. Talked about the scams by people receiving a fat pay check, like Rajat Gupta the first Indian CEO of a Multinational firm, MCKINSEY. He was indicted for insider trading when he was finance director of GOLDMAN SACHS.

I also, highlighted various aspects of ethics, which should be taught, starting right from childhood. I talked about various scams that have earlier taken place in India like the 2G scam, chopper scam, and CWG scam and stated how demonic is the stature of these crimes due to the big names linked to it. I also added the point how India is a corruption driven country, and what are the necessary steps required to provide a solution to the problems. I also gave examples of the ways the problem of corruption can be curbed in the country. I mentioned about Jan Lokpal Bill, and the initiative taken for transparent governance, which might turn out to be one of the most important steps.

Personal Interview

The interview lasted for about 15-20 minutes. There were 2 panelists, a Lady of around 40 years and a Sir of around 55-60 years.

Panel1: Tell me something about yourself.

Candidate: I told them about my schooling, the place where I was born and brought up, recalling my journey from a small town of Midnapore to Jadavpur and how topping there gave me self-confidence and self-belief. I also mentioned how my internship at Ericsson as a consultant gave me the required push towards management, and told them my hobbies and interests.

PANELIST2: What principles of Arya Samaj did you learn in DAV – will it help you in management?

Candidate: I was quite awestruck, but I cogitated and gave the answer. I told them I learnt perseverance, ethics and integrity which would help me more in handling a good business rather than being only successful. I told them how we were made to perform 'havans' and yoga in our extra period in school, and how they help me concentrate and focus better on the work that's in hand.

PANELIST2: Seemed satisfied, but then asked can you tell me the name of a company that works with absolute ethics?

Candidate: Was caught absolutely off guard! I told them about TATA, Google, Yahoo, Microsoft and the way Bill Gates invested most of his income in philanthropic activities. But my biggest mistake was to take the name of Reliance (Beware guys, do not tell anything which is not under the purview of your knowledge or understanding!!)

PANELIST2: Haha!! Did you just say Reliance? My boy, you need to do some homework!!!

The baton was then taken by the Female Professor who was a little scary!!

PANELIST1: Okay X, you have done secondary market research. Can you tell me what this secondary market research is?

Candidate: I explained that basically when you do a market study of the paper and information collated by a huge market research or consultancy firms like Gartner, PWC, Deloitte etc., then that is called as secondary market research.

PANELIST1: Was pretty satisfied. Then asked me what I had done in the project?

Candidate: I told them that my research areas which were basically the upcoming technologies related to the internet of things like cognitive computing, mobile financial services, automation of vehicles, future networks etc.

PANELIST1: Can you tell me a real scenario where you could apply IOT?

Candidate: This was the best phase of my interview (smile)!! I started by telling them that I have a startup idea based on internet, of things which I would like to share with them. (Interviewers got excited!!).

Sir, I have got a business idea in line with OLA and Uber cabs. Sir/ma'am, we can connect sensors to our electrical lines. We would provide mobile phones to the electrician in a neighborhood and connect the sensors to the respective mobile phones. Whenever there is a fault in the electrical line, the nearest electrician would be notified of the problem. By GPS the nearest mobile phone will be connected and he can come and fix the problem. In this way we can have things connected, like the electrical line to the net and can bring it under the purview of the internet.

PANELIST1 seemed Satisfied!!

Again the male Prof. interjected and started asking questions.

PANELIST1: Asked questions on probability distributions that I had studied in my engineering.

Candidate: I told them about normal, Poisson and Gaussian distribution (Was expecting cross questions and got extremely tensed as I am not a stats guy).

Share of renewables in India's electricity generation is about 15-20 % and it is at an increasing trend. So, both things have to go in tandem.
